

Janet's Colville Late Summer Jaunt: The Plains, HiLo Country, and Volcanoes

My schedule this summer did not allow for much camping and autumn didn't look much better so I took the week of Sept. 18 off from my obligations and head southeast out of Denver to the Plains. I'd not been in this area of Colorado before and I wanted to see it for myself. Plus Captain Kirk, my trusty '88 Vanagon needed to stretch his axles.

After leaving Denver proper I got on CO83 to Franktown, then onto CO86 to Limon, hooking up with 40/287 down to 50 and over to John Martin State Park and La Junta. The trip through Elizabeth surprised me with rolling hills, pines and subdivisions but which opened onto the high plains prairie I was looking for by the time I hit Kiowa. Old farmhouses and open spaces gave my eyes the distance



they were yearning. A construction detour onto sandy CR129 to Matheson, a sleepy, rusty farming town worthy of a wildlife sanctuary took me then into Limon via CO24. The roads were pretty good though some of them showed signs of winter's cold winds, sand and salt besides snow plows removing stubborn ice. I was in cattle country with some farming thrown in for feed. The lay of the land is flat and vast with washes sculptured by water and wind, carpeted in grass and wildflowers.

My tour through Limon left little impression other than the American flags hanging from every vertical pole. While I didn't see a Walmart I did notice the empty store fronts and general run-down condition of the old town. But then I was to see that often. I stopped in Hugo at the Brass Hat Antique Store (some people stop at auto shops, I stop at antique shops) and had lunch at a "grandma" cafe. Not much to mention of Kit Carson or Eads or Wiley...dots on the map with few amenities but those still there catering to the locals. It was along this stretch that I first encountered

I know Kirk collided with at least several hundred, my windshield a yellow gooey mess (not to mention the rest of the front of him). I was pleased with myself for taking a spray bottle of Windex along as the butterfly slaughter continued for many miles into La Junta.

At CO50 I turned west, then onto 194 to Bent's Old Fort National Historic Site, a trading fort for the mountain route of the Santa Fe Trail along the Arkansas River. It has been reconstructed, outfitted with things of the times and well worth the side trip. Afterwards I drove around old La Junta then headed back on 50 for Hasty and John Martin Reservoir State Park, a park offering birding, fishing, bicycling, hiking and history, a good place for the club to come to in April or October for a weekend getaway before the cool mountains draw us up. Lots of trees shade the campsites and provide homes for lots of birds including a large flock of Turkey Buzzards. New Years Eve the park is opened (opened year round) to camping with the Bald Eagles and even provides prizes for those who make reservations.

The next day, after waking up to a gaggle of geese flying overhead, I headed into Lamar for a quick look around. I didn't try to search out any "new" growth, but toured the old streets and noticed the old buildings, many empty or for sale. Continuing south I stopped in Springfield (who knew there was a Springfield!!) Here was some life with a very nice antique mall and people talking about e-Bay! The Trails End provided a nice lunch before I continued down to Campo and into Oklahoma. The wind came up between Springfield and Campo but I stopped to take a picture of some hoodoos out in the middle of the prairie. My plan was to head for Black Mesa State Park, located in the panhandle, and spend a day hiking the mesa.


Well, we all know about plans! I stopped in Boise City, OK at the Cimarron Heritage Center Museum. A large, iron sculpture of an Apatosaurus outside a Frank Lloyd Wright want to be building caught my eye and I needed to know more. Dinosaur country, where many bones have been found, accounted for the sculpture. And the building was designed and built in 1949 by Bruce Goff, a student of Wright's, for Julius and Opal Cox. It's a striking cement, glass and steel building with accourrements of the day. Over the years the heritage center has added more buildings and collections to the original property. The exhibits are fascinating collections of the early settlers, everything from farming and home equipment to early cars and tractors and everything in between.

It was here that the curator of the day mentioned that the people who usually were manning the museum were out at Black Mesa at a church camp cooking food for a star gazing party. Hmmm, I thought. I'd brought some stargazing equipment with me hoping to do just that at the park as this area is one of few in the country where the skies are clear of air and light pollution. I figured this was a reservation only party, so I blew it off. However, on my way to the state park, I missed the entrance (due to poor signage), passed the banners showing the way into the camp for the star party and went into the town of Kenton. I spoke with some men who invited me to the party for the night and as that was just up the road rather than several miles back, I said "why not!"

I never hiked Black Mesa, but I spent that afternoon and night chatting with people who had incredible telescopes and stories to tell. I came across 2 gents from Dallas with Eurovans. John Strukmeyer's 2001 red van was beautifully custom fitted to house his astronomy hobby and Kent Kirkley's white '97 Winnebago looked like it was just out of the showroom. Their refractor telescopes are their main passion, and they freely admit no one should be taken with it like they are. Looking at the stars that night through my own binoculars and everyone else's telescopes (up to 32") was a real treat for me, seeing 4 of Jupiter's moons, Andromeda galaxy, several globular and galactic clusters,



shooting stars and many other astronomical phenomena. Since I kind of "crashed" this event I tried to keep a low profile and left early the next morning for my next adventure. But next year I think I'll sign up for the whole week and enjoy my interest with everyone else's passions.



I took 406 west and south to Clayton, NM. Clayton is a railroad town catering to farmers and stockmen, founded in 1888 and became the country seat in 1893. This is HiLo country. The road in is up and down, twisty-turny and lonely. That's the one thing I can definitely say my reaction to this area was: Lonely. 3000 square miles and about 2500 people make up this part of New Mexico. Nothing grows high here unless it's a tree in a wash of water; most things grow low because the endless wind dries out the soil and clips everything in the bud. Clayton itself is a prairie town, larger than most I'd been through. Several older buildings are still in use as intended including the Eklund Hotel, a turn of the century beauty, and what was the general store and is now the hardware store across the street. The historic Methodist Episcopal Church is now the Herzstein Memorial Museum housing many artifacts from the homesteading years.

I spent the night at Clayton Lake State Park where dinosaur tracks are the main attraction, though the lake offered good fishing (I'm told) and boating. The tracks are protected by a boardwalk which keeps us folk off them, plus offers a better way to view them. Here again the sky was pretty dark except for a few lights around the park buildings. I star gazed for about an hour until the wind came up. The wind stayed the night through bringing rain and thunder storms with fireballs of lightening.

The morning dawned cold and drizzly and windy. I'm talking 50-75 mph winds, the kind that stretch the canvas on the pop-top so far out that it was almost impossible to close. I was barely able to close the top, but the canvas bulged out. I threw everything into the van and drove to the park buildings where I was able to get enough relief from the wind to re-close the top properly. I drove out of the park by 8AM...too early for me...and headed back to Clayton. I stopped to take a picture of a windmill and almost lost the door as the wind howled. I watched green tumbleweed get uprooted and roll across the road! That's windy! But of course I was in dust-bowl territory...

From Clayton I drove 64/87 to Capulin Volcano National Monument. The wind went unabated and all I could get Kirk to do was 40-45 with the pedal to the metal. Most of the way was construction with 45 as the speed limit, so I

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Blast from the past... The Transporter's Greatest Hits

Gearhead's View of Type 2/Vanagon Camshaftery by Bob Donalds

Not everybody will find the subject of camshafts exciting. But if you're considering a redo or upgrade of your Type 2 engine, I can change the selection of a camshaft from chance to an informed choice.

The first item you want to consider for the rebuild or upgrade is the camshaft. Time takes its toll on your camshaft. It will need to be replaced or reground. Let me say, there is no such thing as a good used camshaft. I have a selection of used cams and only use those re-ground to hydraulic specifications in my rebuilds. An OEM camshaft should cost over \$250.00 and lifters go for \$30.00 each. Going to the dealer for these items is not for me though. So, what are the other choices? I prefer new cast iron aftermarket cams available from Web Cam.

Web Cam advertises in VW Trends and Hot VW's. They do not come with the drive gear installed but they have new gears for sale. I use gears from junk OEM cams and I think they are made from better material. These gears do require some modification to let the bolts clear the oil pump.

This gets confusing, doesn't it? But there is still more to it. There are two different kinds of lifters; OE-style (Original Equipment) and the Johnson lifter for aftermarket cast iron cam's. They cannot be interchanged, trust me. I have had to rebuild more than one engine before I figured this out.

I have seen solid lifter camshafts in hydraulic engines from Volkswagen. There are also two different lift camshafts in hydraulic engines. I've seen anywhere from 240 thousandths lift to 290 thousandths lift at the push rod. The stock Web Cam hydraulic cams come in at 270 thousandths lift, which is a good compromise.

So if you're thinking a big bump stick will give you more power, yes, it will once you get above 3000 RPM. There is no low end power left. This translates to no power in fourth gear below 50 m.p.h.. You cannot make the hills without down shifting. I get calls on this all the time. "What can I do to restore the low end power?" They ask. "Put the stock cam back in," I say. Web Cam will not sell you a performance cam for your van. It does not work.

Now, you may ask, what performance options are there on an engine in a late Bus or Vanagon? How do you increase the power throughout the power range? These are the real questions. We've covered the camshaft. You can't beat the stock fuel injection system even if you don't understand it. I don't know of any exhaust upgrades. The valve job is very important.

Let me back up a few steps. I replace valve seats on all type II/Vanagon heads. Then I cut in the new seat angles with carbide cutters. Notice, I said "angles". I start with a narrow 30° angle cut at the outer edge of the valve. Next is a 45° cut followed by 60° and 70° cuts to establish flow sooner, and increase the total breath the valve takes per opening. This multi-angle valve job is very effective at horsepower gains throughout a broader power range and does what a mild performance camshaft would like to do.

For those of you looking to rebuild a 1.9 Liter early water boxer motor, the camshaft profile and gear are equivalent to any four bolt, solid lifter, bug motor cam. The 2.1 Liter camshaft would be a good upgrade for the 1.9 Liter water boxer because it's more aggressive, with a higher lift that would increase power without losing driveability.

Give me a call if you have any camshaft or motor rebuilding questions.

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Vanity Plates

A few weeks ago the Minneapolis Star Tribune newspaper had an article on the 70,000 vanity plates issued in Minnesota. On Monday they had a story on an individual and why he obtained his vanity plate. They asked for other stories, so here is what I submitted to the "Strib" as it's known. I have no idea wether it'll get published, but here's how it came about

I've been a VW bus/van enthusiast since I bought my first one in 1969. In 1995 my wife Chris and I bought a 1985 VW Vanagon Westfalia camper that we still own. Since I'd previously purchased vanity plates for our 1965 VW bus, AIRCOOL (it has an aircooled engine), I thought I'd get vanity plates for the '85 also.

The first idea I came up with was POPTOP, since the camper has a roof that rises to allow not only more head room, but also provides an area for two people to sleep "up top", other than the normal two person bed that unfolds from a seat in the rear of the van. I applied to the state only to learn that POPTOP had been taken. Back to the drawing board. I then came up with VWHAUS, which was appropriate since VWs are of German manufacture and Haus is German for House, as a camper is a form of house on wheels. However I wasn't quite satisfied with that, so I began to fool around with letter combinations.

I should mention that because the camper had RV plates, I was limited to 6 digits instead of the normal 7. I came up with a list of letter and number combinations that I thought might suit the vehicle, but still I wasn't satisfied. With further letter play came up with VWOWV. This was something that was more of a well balanced visual design incorporating VW, (I'm a sign painter by occupation), and it was palindromic too: reads the same forwards and backwards. This really appealed to my sensibilities! I showed it to Chris and we both agreed that this was THE choice, and we bet that no one else in the state had that plate. I went to the local DMV and filled out the paper work and, of course, got the plate.

I want to point out that we both came of age during the 1960s. What Chris and I failed to see in the plate initially, was the fact that WOW (a phrase used often in the late 60s) was surrounded by two peace signs, the Vs! How subliminal was this choosing? We'll never know.



Cover with nylon both sides sewing edges is advisable to increase ridgeity and durability. Joint at the back has ample overlap and may be shortened to suit. Joint is made using Velcro. Attachment to front top of popttop made using four snaps or Velcro in the 1.5" X 50" section.

Recently, I found a deal that was to good to be true. I was on eBay and there was a 2001 Eurovan MV weekender listed. It was silver, alloy wheels, loaded 50K miles with extra installed by the owner. The listing said he only wanted 4000 dollars but he didn't have a 'Buy it now' button. Now, a low price for something like that wouldn't be unusual if it had a bad engine, transmission or something major like that.

I kept reading the description looking for the answer to the question- why was it so cheap? Nothing, everything was perfect ready to roll. Now my spider sense is going off. This can't be right. It had Texas plates on it, so maybe it was flooded in the hurricanes. Nope, nothing. There were a couple of other bidders already. So I figured why not, lets bid. If its for real, what a deal I'm getting. Shortly after I bid, I got a notice from Ebay that my bid was cancelled contact the seller.

This is where it gets interesting. I contacted the seller and he says he's out of the country, getting married over in Germany, I think, and is selling everything here in the states. He cancelled the bids because he really only wanted 4000 dollars because he wanted to make a quick sale AND he is going to pay shipping to my place. What a deal, I'd be a fool not to buy. What's more suspicious is even though the van had Texas plates, it's in South Carolina and I can't come and look at it.

This is where I stopped. Ding Ding, bells are going off, Scammer, Scammer, step away from the computer. As the saying goes,

if its too good to be true, it probably is. I put a message on a couple of the mailing lists I'm on, plus contacted some friends and told them what was happening.

Everyone agreed that this was a scam. If I couldn't look at it first, it must be a scam. Fellow member Dan Winget contacted me and told me he was looking at the exact same van. He contacted eBay and they told him that the sellers ID had been Highjacked and that the auction was a scam.

The scam goes basically like this, you send the 'seller' the money and you wait. There is some communication that the van is on it way or something like that. Weeks go by, no van and the contact info you have is now dead so you can't track them. You're out the money and no

I knew after reading the description that it was a scam and I should have backed away then, but that carrot was too good to pass up. I didn't lose any money or anything, I stopped communicating with the 'seller' and forgot about the whole thing.

There is another scam out there I've heard about that works slightly different. You're selling a car on the internet, someone from out of the country contacts you and says he'll pay your price. He's going to send you a check but for some reason the check is made out more than your asking price. He asks you to cash the check, and send him back the balance. Then the check bounces and you're out the cash. The only positive in that is usually you still have the car.

The point of my story is there are a lot of scammers out there and some of them are not as obvious. So be careful when buying something over the net. This little experience hasn't put me off buying stuff off eBay or places like that, but I'm on my guard a little more now. I'm keeping my search radius down to a two day drive so I can look at this and make sure its real before I commit to buy. Or I'm asking members in the area to take a look at it for me and see if its legit.

By the way, I should be getting my portion of 25 million dollars of poor dead Mutumba's money from Nigeria any day. I understand that Dale Ward was fortunate enough to have the same thing happen to him. Must be a lot of rich dead people in Nigeria.
