So, now I've used all my column up to explain this addictive sport/ pastime/hobby. Check it out!! Maybe you too will get involved.





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An Interview with Evans

Tell us about yourself and your family:

I am an Industrial Engineer at Schott Lighting and Imaging in Southbridge MA. Beth works for another fiber optics company in Charlton MA as a Benefits specialist. Between us we have 4 kids who are all in their late 20's to early 30's.



Tell us the story about how you got your Vanagon:

My ownership of the van started in April 2001 when my father gave it to me when I asked if he would mind if I registered it. As I write this it is the Saturday before Father's day and we will be seeing him and my mom tomorrow at my sisters. His name is also Evans and he is 86 years old.

My first impression of this van was not good. My father let me drive it sometime in the mid 1990's and I thought it slow and with poor gas mileage. He bought it in 91 for \$5,800 and with 43,662 miles on it. He and my mother took it on many trips to New Hampshire, Florida and even to visit my sister in Seattle WA. It may have been after that trip that he stopped using it on long trips and that may have been because the driver's side wheel came off somewhere on the way home. When I got it, the speedometer did not work because the wheel came from a junkyard or at least the dust cap was for a passenger side without the square hole for the speedometer cable.

Anyway, a few years before I got the van in 2001, My buddy Ray was looking for a Vanagon and inquired about my Dad's. It had been in the back yard for several year; being used as a storage vehicle. Dad would not sell it to him, so Ray bought a 1984 low mileage Wolfsburg (very nice).

When I got the van in 2001, it needed some work and I ended up taking an auto body night course at the trade school in town and removed most of the dents and repainted it. That course was a lot of fun! The job is not of professional quality but did save it.

How Did you get Involved in LiMBO?

I joined LiMBO after a camping trip to Nickerson State Park on Cape Cod, meeting up with Ray and his then wife Julie. Just outside the park, my water pump failed. I had all the hoses as well as the pump in the van along with my tools, so I thought I would attempt the repair at the campsite. After I got into the job, I realized I could not get out the water pump bolts.

Ray had a LiMBO newsletter in his van where I found the phone number of Dale Ward so I gave him a call hoping to learn how to get it out. I realized after talking to Dale that I needed a cut down Allen wrench. This meant I would not be getting the pump out on that Sunday. I ended up having the van towed the 100 miles home and joined LiMBO right after that!

Since then Beth and I have attended many great Limbo camping events, including Busses by the Big Duck, Busses by the Buoy, West River Westies, Transporters by the Tunnel, and even one in Cape May. The longest trip we did in the van was a 10-day, 2,300 mile trip to PEI. We look forward to attending at least some Limbo events each year.

So I started not thinking too much about VW vans but in a few years time we have had many great adventures in ours.

Evans



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We started with a 1989 Carat model van. Because we had just had a remanufactured engine installed, we decided that starting all over on another van just wasn't an option. We preferred the weekender model over the full Westy, anyway, so thus started our trek to convert what we had into what we wanted!



Kenny found a Westy top locally through a guy who sells a lot of 'good quality parts' at an ok price. (Well, he's a little expensive...but through experience, we found out it's you get what you pay for!) We picked up the top and hardware for \$500 (minus the skylight).

The top cleaned up beautifully with a little bleach water. As for the skylight, we lucked out and our mechanic happened to have had a wrecked Westy which still had the skylight intact (it was cracked) and he gave us the guts of it and all Kenny had to do was replace the plastic. That would have been an expensive endeavor had he not offered that up to us!

First step: mounting the luggage rack. Kenny was a little

nervous about this, but had a great idea on how to mark the drill holes. Using double sided foam tape on the metal brackets that would be screwed to the roof, he lowered the luggage rack down, unscrewed the brackets, and voila!, they stuck to the roof just as he planned! Whew, that was smooth!



Next, Kenny started to mark the roof for the 'incision'. Kenny measured off of the support beams in order to draw the template. I came out just as he was about to make his first cut and he said, "I'm about to ruin a perfectly good van!". Well, we were both a little nervous! I could hear him sawing away in the garage and I couldn't bear to look! I came out to find him standing in the hole. He took great care to preserve the headliner so that it could be tucked away. It was by shear accident that he discovered the luggage rack seal would perfectly finish off the cut and tuck in the headliner for a clean finish.

It took 2 seals to do the hole. He used the Bus Depot seals for the interior, but the Go Westy seals were much nicer on the Luggage Rack! Bolting the roof on was a little tricky. For the



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first time in the project, Kenny called for reinforcement. It definitely took a few hands to hold the roof steady to mark the hinge holes and mount it.

Our canvas had been ordered and was dropped shipped from Go Westy. It arrived just in time for our quick weekend getaway with our friend Bryan. Kenny and Bryan installed the canvas that weekend at the campground. Yes, at the campground! This whole process was done in about 2 weeks.



To finalize the top, Kenny made a platform for up top and we used the larger Westy cushion from the top bed....it fits perfectly! Kenny also fabricated a wooden 'railing' that folds up to keep the kids from falling out. For now, one or both fit up there.

In a few years, we will have to come up with another plan to finish the full size bed, which requires moving a beam and welding. Kenny also has made a child's cot for the front seats using the 70's bus kid's cot brackets and some steel tubes, which is also working great for now. We hope to boot the kids out into a tent when they get a little older! Hahaha



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

Cookin over the Campfire Shrimp and Pasta ala Tony

Over Memorial day weekend the Hole in the Woods Gang had an impromptu campout at Tracey's log cabin on 4 acres of side hill in Ct. After a Thursday night of drinking kakilla (tequila) Tony made us this surprise dish.

As it turns out this was not the only surprise we would get this weekend, you will have too ask Tony and Jen about that surprise. Congratulations Tony and Jen.

Ok, on to the recipe at hand,

What you will need:

- 4 lbs of shrimp (cleaned and peeled)
- 1 large onion
- 1 green bell pepper
- 4 garlic cloves
- 3 small zucchinis
- 1 stick of butter
- 1/2 cup extra virgin olive oil
- A bunch of fresh basil
- 1 lb of pasta your choice salt and pepper to taste.
