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

the day laid their heads down in Charleston, SC. LIVC with



New York... These two words were at the center of all our preoccupations during so many months that it was crazy to think that now we were leaving the Big Apple. Just before going over the bridge to Staten Island, We stopped the bus in front of a pizzeria for five minutes, just to buy a cup of coffee. From the pizzeria, out come some of the workers who noticed the bus. They came to speak with us and they even invited us in for the best pizza that we have eaten since we left Argentina!

A few minutes after we get back on the road we start reminiscing of all this city has given to us. A great Christmas, the snow, the wonders of Manhattan, the beauty of Long Island and all the friends we met including Manny, Maria, Steve, Andrea, Brad, Don, Sue, Frank, Peter, Kristin... New York has been great to us and we are feeling very nostalgic right now.

We wanted to be in Miami before January, the 30th, to assist with our first VW event in the US: the Volksblast, in Miami. And so we did. It was a long drive but with the heat fixed by our friends of the LIVC, we really enjoyed it. We discovered Charleston, SC and felt in love with this beautiful city. Then we stopped for few days in Saint Augustine. We discovered (and enjoyed) the Kennedy Space Center and finally, we arrived in Miami on Thursday, January 28th. The most Latin-American city of the US welcomed us with a big sun and we spent the two first days on the beach, swimming and swimming and swimming! Then we discovered the different aspects of the city: the Cuban district, Miami Beach , the art deco buildings and the downtown.

On Saturday, Volksblast officially started (even though we helped prepare for it days before with the club). As we did in other shows before, we transformed the bus into a little store to show and sell our t-shirts, postcards and framed photos. We began meeting people too.

Now we have to tell that since the beginning of the trip we have been looking for sponsorship, and have spent entire days looking. We wrote presentational documents in the three languages we know, looked for contacts of the marketing services of all the enterprises which might have an interest, and sent hundreds and hundreds of emails...all without any positive answer.



Then on Sunday, the 31st of January, during Volksblast the miracle finally happened. Again, with our little shop set up, we started speaking with a man, telling him about the dream we have and the long road that we still have to drive. We were speaking in Spanish. He listened to us and at the end of our conversation, he gave us \$20 and wished us "good luck". An hour later, we were speaking with other people and the man came back. We looked at him and he said "Sabes que? Yo te voy a pagar la gasoline hasta Francia!" (Translation: You know what? I will pay for your gas until France").

We couldn't believe it. At the beginning, we didn't want to believe it. We spent the entire day selling our stuff and saying that we don't yet think that it's really true as it could be a false promise. But at the end of the day, when we called the man, he invited us to his house so we could speak about our project!

Joe Orriols is the name of the man and Bullseye (<u>www.bullseyepowdercoating.com</u>) is the name of the first enterprise who wanted to help us. More than a sponsorship, we found new friends. Joe himself, his wife Dalia, his associate Leo; all of them were so sweet to us. We really feel that there is a personal connection with this sponsor that would not be there if it were sponsorship from a large enterprise. Joe feels like he's a part of our journey and we believe he's an important part.

Bullseye a metal refinishing company, is probably the only small company that uses a technology traditionally reserved to the big industry. They paint all kinds of metallic pieces. They usually do a lot of work on cars and they gave us such a perfect finish to our wheels and bumpers that they looked like new. When Joe saw the huge difference, between the "new looking" wheels next to the old and sick paint of the bus, he decided to give a new paint job to Renata (our bus) and now our loved bus looks like a new one!

One more time, we felt very nostalgic when we had to take the road again. On Sunday, the 14th (Valentine's Day), we celebrated our first wedding anniversary in Disney World and the we made the longest drive of the trip: from Orlando to El Paso in one week, including a stop in New Orleans during Mardi Gras!

It's where we are right now, on Sunday, February 21st. Tomorrow we will go back in Mexico. We will spend few days in one of our favorite countries and then we will enter back in the US. We still have a lot of things to see there. The great National Parks of the West, and California, where we'll have to take the boat that will transport our bus to Asia.

We are long-time VW fans, my husband and I. I have had VWs since the early '70's when I got my first driving licenses in Ohio. In 1987, we bought a new Vanagon Camper. That vehicle has travelled all over the United States. We still have it, but now with a 5 speed and a Tiico conversion. We also have a 1965 Vintage VW convertible. At the same time, we continue to buy and drive other VWs, Audis as well as other German and American cars.



We first moved overseas to Abu Dhabi in the United

Arab Emirates. We took our 1965 VW with us. Since all the cars there were new, and only few old VWs in the UAE, the Emiratis seem to be "car crazy" an expressed much interest in our 1965.

When we moved to Cairo, Egypt things were much different on the VW scene. Old VW beetles and busses were and still are being used for everyday transportation needs. Egyptians, through necessity and clever mechanics, manage to keep VWs on the road long past the usual dates with the junk-yard. It's not uncommon to see VWs from the 1950s still in use as everyday cars - some having added modern VW fenders and tail lights. Determining the exact model year of a beetle or a bus takes guite a bit of examination and research.

When we first moved to Cairo, one of the memorable sights, was of an old Transporter, side door and windows all open, with kids screaming and hanging from the open doors and windows. It drove down a busy street, dropping small boys off after school. The bus wouldn't come to a full halt, but slowed down, and the boys standing by the open side door (barn door) would hop off at their stop - akin to parachute jumpers! Certainly a sight that would make most American parents cringe. I could have kicked myself for not getting a photo.

Throughout Cairo, Transporters are used for a variety of business purposes. New

Hassan, the owner of this van, is very proud of his home-made

conversion from air-cooled to water-cooled. He also built the roof-top rack himself and painted the entire van by hand with a brush. It will not win a beauty contest but he drives it on the busy streets of Cairo each day. This van started out as a 1981 air-cooled. Hassan added a home-made set of headlights to mimic South African headlights along with a radiator and a carbureted Golf 1800cc engine (thus converting it from air to water). Hassan made the new front radiator vent himself. Hassan was is also proud to point out the water pipes running coolant up to the front. He made sure we noticed his plumbing and mechanical work. He says the van cruises at 120 kilometers per hour on the highway with the new engine - much better than before.

the Cairenes keep their machines going forever. They cobble pieces together, and have access to parts shipped in from Brazil. You'll see some Eurovans but the older Type II's (Splitties and Bays) are what most Cairene Bus owners use.

In Giza, across the Nile from Cairo where the Pyramids are located, these white buses are referred to as "White Chickens" (picture at top left of page). They are the main source of mass transit in the suburb. They travel the streets of Giza, side door and the engine door open. They even have their own "Bus Station". They leave the engine bay door open because they claim that the open door gives better engine cooling.



COOKIN' OVER THE CAMPFIRE

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With Spring almost here lets get cooking with a side dish. With spring, brings picnics, bbq'a corn on the cob, and camping. There are a few ways to do this.

One way is to boil it. The traditional way is get a big pot of water and bring to a boil, throw a handful of sugar in. Next throw the cleaned ears of corn and boil for 12-15 minutes. Take out add butter and salt and eat.

Another way is to grill it (Tony's favorite). Peal the husk back and remove the silk. Soak the ears in water for at least 1/2 an hour. Recover the corn in its husk and place on the fire. Turn every 3 minutes for 15 minutes. Remove, husk, add butter and salt and pepper.

A third way, and my personal favorite (and Kaiya's too) is to grill without the husk. To do this, husk the corn clean. Now get some 4aluminum foil about 16 inch long pieces. Put an ear of corn on it, then sprinkle some steak seasoning on it. Personally, I like to put fresh chopped garlic on the corn. Now put 4 pats of butter on each ear. Roll it up, seal the ends and put it on the fire. You have to turn it every couple of minutes so it doesn't burn. It should only take about 10 minutes (depending on how hot the fire is). Tear open the foil and enjoy- you don't have to add a thing, it's already there. That's why I like the last one the best.


