


Another good show I went to just the week before was the VW reunion at Woodstock. Its put on by the Hudson and Mohawk Society of VW owners (HAMS).

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ANOTHER TALE FROM THE 1945 UNDERWOOD

Bay Window defrosters leave a lot to be desired! While preparing our '70 van w/911- 6 cyl. for the trip to Hershey last year (Bus To Chocolate Town) I contemplated fresh air defrosters. The 911 puts out plenty of hot air defrost but I wanted to clear the windshield during the high humidity of rainstorms without using the heater. Even using the heat defroster in cold weather creates window fogging until the inside air heats up because the cold, moist air condenses on the warm glass until the air is dry enough to prevent it.

I had seen a couple ads & articles on the "Heater/ defroster Boost System" from Barney's Import Parts in Tucson, Arizona (800-833-3827 or 520-888-8200). This looked like a possible solution. I ordered the kit (\$130+ \$9SH) and when it arrived I proceeded to try and make it do what I wanted. The two high RPM "jet type" fans are about 2" in diameter and 6" long. Where could I fit these into my fresh air vent behind the dash? After removing The cardboard kick panels and studied the challenge for a couple days; looking into different ducting modifications and mounting brackets I was stumped. The fresh air grill beneath the windshield leads to a large square plenum (I guess where the rainwater is separated from the fresh air) and then to large 4" ducts to either side of the vehicle. From there the vents to inside the windshield go up to defroster slots and continue on to the door/armrest ducts for the rear passengers. Our van is set up for camping for two people and I have removed the door ducts/ armrest and blocked off the duct at the front edge of the door. Different armrests have replaced them along with a map pocket on the drivers door. So now, all the fresh air goes to the windshield and the two round adjustable vents at the ends of the dash (they do a good job of defogging the side windows.)

At that point the proverbial "LIGHT" came on, the fans are tubular shaped like the round ducts from the square plenum box to the split ducts- could this be the only place to mount them? After removing the split ducts to windshield defroster slots and dash end vents I removed the round outer half of the mid ducts (see photo) measured its diameter, about 4". The mounting ears on the fans were wider so I cut them off with a coping saw, (the fan housings are plastic). That was hard to do because if my plan didn't work I would have to redesign the mounts. Once the mounts were cut off I set the fans into the round section of the ducting and contemplated situation for a while, trying to figure out the simplest way to center the fan in the duct. The next "LIGHT" came on. The fans are somewhat noisy, being designed to mount into the floorpan the noise would not be a problem, but under the dash they were loud! While trying to figure how to quiet the fans the mount revealed itself to me. I cut a piece of 1" foam the length of the fan

housing and wide enough to completely wrap around the fan, "hot dog bun" style and laid it into the duct, it fit tight enough so no other mounts were needed. I replaced the outer half of the duct and screws and hooked it up to the three speed switch provided, turned it on and hoped for the best. It worked! On the two lower speeds it was quiet and on high it was only a little noisy, and it blew lots of fresh air.


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Summer in SoCal is not a good place to test window defrosters so I just had to hope it would work well enough in rain storms. I was concerned that the air flow through the fans when they were off would not be enough to be a real vent, but a quick trip down the freeway showed that, although the volume was diminished, there was still a good amount of cool air coming through the vent. To help this passive air flow I moved the power wire just a bit. There are three struts mounting the fan motor to the inside of its housing. The wire comes out of the motor between these struts so I drilled a hole in the housing in line with one of the struts (see diagram). I then put some shrink tubing on the wire where it goes through the joint of the fresh air duct of the van and hooked up both fans the switch mounted under the dash.

Our first rainstorm on the trip to "Chocolate Town" was in Tucso, Arizona from the hurricane down in Mexico and then another all the way across Pennsylvania proved that the installation worked fine, however, the vents must be open fully.

The old "Blue Shoebox" now has great hot and cold defrosters. We're still contemplating air conditioning though and the newly rebuilt 911 runs fine.

Mid-West Show Revue- By Jerry Spellman NIVA Show

NIVA (Northeast Illinois Volkswagen Association) and Anderson Volkswagen, Crystal Lake, IL, pulled off VW-FEST 2005, "northern Illinois' largest all-VW car show and swap meet". For spectator free entry, minimum show and swap entry fee, this was the place to go. On show display were many levels of quality preservations and restorations, a wide time spread of air-cooled and water-cooled cars, an easy grouped view of cars in 20 show classes, a range of colors from the visible light spectrum (infrared and ultraviolet wavelengths were present as well!) and of course many colorful people sharing their specialties.

Swappers, toy venders, tee-shirt venders, and food providers did, in some cases, a serious business. The clear day warmed all without overheating. NIVA and Anderson VW generously staffed the show which obviously required planning, set-up, and clean-up.

Harsh Winters Vintage VW Club Show

Well, the Earl of Sandwich did not show up again, but some near 65 show VWs plus even more non-show VWs parked in the Sandwich, IL, fairgrounds. Why did they come, you ask? Well, the Harsh Winters Vintage VW Club put on their annual show toward the end of a harsh summer in this midwest area. (Maybe they may become the Harsh Summers Vintage...) Well, and that's a deep subject, even so, the location was a grass and tree area presenting not a harsh day at all. The club put their registration tent in the blazing sun, the swappers (about 12 or so) were located in mild sun, but the cars were nearly all in the shade.

The club did all the work: making grilled food, snack food, and drink food available; staking out organized locations for the various show classes; securing an area for spectator parking; running a few childrens games; providing background music for the day; dispensing numerous donated door prizes; and fabricating individualized show trophies right there on site.

There were twelve show classes (air and water) plus "rust" and "best of show". Trophies were created for 1st, 2nd,and 3rd places. There were many excellent looking cars (best of show was a '62 23 window split window bus), loads of sociable people, pleasant swappers, lots of happy participants. Nothing harsh about this show!

Manasas Bug Out 58

"Cheers rang through the streets of Washington, July1861, as Gen. McDowell's army, 35000 strong, marched out to begin the long awaited campaign to capture Richmond and end the war. It was an army of green recruits, few of whom had the faintest idea of the magnitude of the task before them. But their swaggering gait showed that none doubted the outcome. As excitement spread, many citizens and congressmen with wine and picnic baskets followed the army into the field to watch what all expected would be a colorful show." (U.S. Dept of the Interior document)

Well, I didn't see congressmen with wine and picnic baskets, but it was a colorful show, it was exciting, there were swaggering gaits, it was an awaited "campaign". My wife and I marched around the BUGOUT 58 at Old Dominion Speedway in Manassas, Virginia. Though there may not have been 35000 strong, there were hundreds of cars, thousands of people, millions of new and old parts, and uncountable verbal exchanges of help, compliments, and suggestions.

Perhaps you know that two Civil War battles were fought in the area, First Manassas (First Bull Run), July 1861, and Second Manassas (Second Bull Run), August 1862. In the first, both sides were stunned by the violence and destruction. Both sides had thought the war's outcome would be decided quickly. The Washingtonians came out to watch but were entrapped in a Union rout of retreat which the Confederates were too disorganized to follow up. Thus, a sort of draw. It was during this battle that Gen. Jackson picked up the nickname of "Stonewall Jackson". In the second battle there was greater carnage. The Confederacy was brought to the height of its power with several bold moves outwitting the Feds. The Feds withdrew seemingly in defeat. Manassas junction had been a supply depot for the Feds.

Nowadays, among other things, Manassas is the location for a rather large show of VW cars, VW venders, VW swappers, VW drag racers, and assorted VW pleasing things. The variety of cars included those from air-cooled to water-cooled, from young to old, from trailer queen to daily driver, from pristine to shabby, from polished to drab. The perfections in the cars and the quantity of the buyers, sellers, and just plain "tire kickers" was astounding. All was in living color. Wilma and I got in much walking exercise and if you were to come so would you! We bought parts, looked at cars, watched races, ate hot dogs, talked to many people, took pictures, and trapsed back and forth. We did not do everything possible! Besides what I have mentioned, there were Drag races and other events like a Slalom, awards for show cars, for race winners, and the slalom winners (cash as well as pride). More and better details will, no doubt, show up in a national magazine in six months or so, eh?

Although it's tough to get to so many, support those local shows far and near.



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Destinations

Hyder, Alaska - By Bill Dummit

The holy grail for many campers (VW-driving and otherwise) in the US is a road trip to Alaska. It is the ultimate American road trip. I can remember countless campfire discussions where an Alaska road trip was the dream of all the participants. Bev and I made such a trip and wrote a Transporter article about it in 1999. A trip including Anchorage and Fairbanks from most places on the US/Canada border takes a week or more each way up the Alcan, plus whatever time is spent in Alaska. Add it all up and a decent road trip normally ends up taking at least a month. It can be done in less, but at such a rapid pace that it takes the fun out of travel.

One spot in Alaska is a lot closer, though. The community of Hyder, deep in the southeast arm of the state, is a great road trip destination. Come to think of it, it is strictly a road trip destination, since there really isn't any other way to get there. Hyder lies at the end of an acess road that heads west from Cassiar Highway in western BC. Cassiar Highway itself is one of the most remote and scenic highways in North America. It can be reached in three or four days driving from Seattle or most other spots along the western half of the US/Canada border, a little longer from further east or south. A grand two-week trip from Seattle, Spokane, or Glacier Park as a jumping-off place could incluce Glacier, Banff, and Jasper National Parks, with Hyder as the northernmost destination and your choice of many other fascinating destinations in British Columbia and western Alberta included. Two weeks is a lot easier to manage for most working people than a month. Hyder has a sort of "sister" city just across the border in BC. In fact, you can't get to Hyder without driving through Stewart, BC, Hyder being at the end of the road that leads to and through Stewart. Geographically isolated from the rest of Alaska, not to mention to the rest of the US, Hyder depends on BC for most goods and services. Most merchants prefer Canadian currency since they don't have a US bank. All this notwithstanding, there is no doubt when you enter the town that you've left Canada and entered the USA. Stewart, BC is straighter and more prim than Hyder. I've heard at least one report that Stewart is hostile to perceived counterculture types such as VW bus owners, although I've never experienced anything negative. Hyder is definitely on the other side of the fence, since many residents (there are only about 100 year-round) seem to qualify as a counterculture types. Most houses are obviously owner-built and there clearly is not a lot of social pressure to actually finish a house once it is habitable. The best place to eat is a seafood place called The Bus, housed, naturally, in a converted bus. Not a VW bus, but it has the same charm nonetheless. There is a large community of summer residents in the local RV park, and they are one of the happiest groups I've run into in my travels. As one of them put it, everything you'd go to Alaska to see is there in Hyder- brown and black bears, giant glaciers, deep fjords. If you're looking for a spotless, neatly painted village such as you might find in New England, you're in the wrong place. For that matter, pretty much all of Alaska would be the wrong place.

The premier attraction from mid-July to September is a creek just north of Hyder that attracts a high brown bear population with its chum salmon run. With so many bears present, professional photographers took notice and began arriving in droves. To minimize unsafe bear/people interactions, the Forest Service erected a fenced boardwalk along the creek. Almost everyone in Hyder shows up regularly at Fish Creek to watch the bears. There are few places like it. It compares well to Katmai National Park on the Alaska Peninsula as a bear-watching destination, but is much easier and cheaper to access.

Also near Hyder is spectacular Salmon glacier, one of the largest in North America that is accessible by road. You have to bump 20 miles down a god-awful dirt road to get there, but it is passable for a 2wd van, and well worth the trip. On the way up you may see dozens of icebergs the size of pickups bouncing down the river from the glacier.

Even just getting to Hyder is spectacular. The access road from the Cassiar highway passes Bear glaciernot as spectacular as Salmon glacier, but still impressive, and within a few hundred feet of the paved road.

If you have time to drive all the way up the Alcan to Alaska, by all means do so. Make sure you take the Cassiar one way and make a stop in Hyder. If you don't have that kind of time, a tour of western BC with Hyder included is almost as good.

So what do you think about the new price of gasoline? WOW. I was thinking about this the other day. In early spring gas hit two bucks. In June I paid 2.15 for gas. Over the course of July and early August, the price rose to about 2.35. Then about the second week of August gas jumped to 2.60. Then Katrina hit. By Labor day weekend gas jumped up to about 3.50 around my area. Rumors were flying gas would hit four dollars per gallon. I imagine in some areas it did.

Now gas has dropped back to about 2.85-2.95. I figure it will hover there for a few months. Until something else comes along to make it rise again. You know of course that we will never see gas under two dollars ever again. Once you get used to paying 3 bucks per gallon, the gas companies will continue to charge that much. Most people will just grin and bear it. If you look around you start to notice there seems to be a lot more expendable cash around these days. Most people will put off buying that DVD or something like that. The only people this will really affect are the people on fixed incomes or those of us who live paycheck to paycheck.

It was kind of wild when the gas prices really started to take off. In the morning I would go to work and the gas was 2.60. At night it jumped up to 2.90. Then next morning it was 3.10 and buy the following evening it was 3.35. Seems to me that the gas in that tank was still the same gas we were paying 2.60 for just yesterday.

I happen to luck out and filled up the tank on the EV just before the big jumps in prices. Barbra filled up at 2.90. Her Jetta gets about 32 M.P.G., so she goes about two and half -three weeks on a tank. She was able to ride out the peak of the gas rush and last week we filled up again at 2.81. Fortunately, the motor home was still full of 2.60 gas so when we went to Old Orchard Beach for Labor Day weekend we only had to fill up for the way home. It still took almost 100 dollars to fill it up for the trip home. Ouch. It still takes almost 60 bucks to fill the Eurovan.
